Languages

With the exception of American Sign Language (ASL), which is an Occupational field, Language faculty at Maricopa must have a master's degree in the language to be taught or a master's degree in any field and 18 equivalent education and/or experience credits in the language to be taught, with a minimum of 9 from education. Faculty teaching a Less Commonly Taught Language (LCTL)* may be qualified to teach without a master's degree. LCTL faculty who do not possess a master's degree must still have 18 equivalent credits. Education credits refer to a semester credit or the quarter session equivalent.

Referee for professional journals in the language to be taught (1 instance = 1 credit)	3	Copy of referee appointment or similar evidence
Participation in nationally-normed language assessment activity such as AP Language or Literature Readings (1 instance = 1 credit)	3	Certificate of Participation, letter from activity organizer, or similar evidence
Documented language proficiency via a nationally recognized assessment such as those offered by NCATE or ACTFL	3	Copy of assessment score
Participation in language-related professional development within the last five years (18 hours = 1 credit)	3	Conference program, certificate of completion
Completion of MCCCD professional development course in language education	3	Transcript
